ALBERT H. FRIEDLANDER (*Humanity and Apocalypse: Confronting the Holocaust*), a Jewish theologian born in Germany, is director of the Leo Baeck College of Theology at Westminster Synagogue in London. His article beginning on page 5, initially published in *Religion and the Humanizing of Man* (1972) appears in SPECTRUM (with the permission of author and editor) as modified and presented at the September 1972 International Congress of Learned Societies in the Field of Religion held in Los Angeles.

RICHARD W. SCHWARZ (The Kellogg Schism) is author of *John Harvey Kellogg, M.D.* (Southern Publishing Association 1970) and published articles and book reviews. He has degrees from Andrews University, University of Illinois, and University of Michigan, and he is chairman of the history and political science department at Andrews University.
